UU Social Justice:

Update on Shawn Rhoden's electrical problem:

The Social Justice Committee has been talking with an Engineer from El Paso Electric on what it would take to get new electric lines not only at Shawn's home, but also his neighbors', since the lines are degraded. Two quotes are expected, and the focus is, for now, on finding out which neighbors might be having similar electrical problems and to let them know what the status of the old lines is. Sharon and Vanessa, with the input of others at UU, have designed a survey to this effect, and will be going door to door in Shawn's neighborhood. The data collected is hoped to serve the community by providing information that may help the city/state find funding that will help bring updated electric lines to the homes of this community in northeast El Paso. City representatives have already been contacted, although no funding is known of yet - still in the beginning searching stages. The hope is that the cost will be able to be split between residents by taking care of it at once, rather than costing so much to do it individually at different times.

Other news:

Sharon Cornet, as UUCEP's Social Justice Committee Chair, is both sad and excited to be leaving for the Seattle, WA area to live and find work now that she has graduated with her BA in Social Science/Anthropology. She is sad because she will miss everyone at UUCEP and in El Paso, but is happy because a new life and career are awaiting her in the Seattle area. She is moving in June, and expects to be back occasionally to visit in the future since her family live here in El Paso. The Wisdom of Sages

from *Trancing the Witch's Wheel* by Yasmine Galenorn

Beltane

The Fifth Sabbat of the Wheel is Beltane, celebrated on May 1st. Beltane is a festival of sexuality and fertility. The Maypole, central to most Beltane rites, signifies the phallus of the God while the wreath atop the pole signifies the vagina of the Goddess. The Maypole is traditionally cut by the men, and the men dig the hole in which it is placed. The women fill the hole with dirt and construct the wreaths for the Maypole and for their own heads. As the ribbons are woven during the dance, the wreath slowly lowers and so the Divine Marriage is symbolically consummated.

The God is now the Young Phallic Lord. He has become the rutting consort of the Goddess and, on Beltane, they mate for the first union of the year. It is at this time that the Goddess becomes pregnant with the new Sun King to whom She will give birth on the Winter Solstice.

Beltane signifies a time of burgeoning growth, passion, and strength for us. It is a time to explore our own sexuality (whatever the focus we may have—heterosexual, homosexual, bisexual, or autosexual) and it is a time to play and revel in the magick as spring turns into summer.

Other traditional activities on Beltane include jumping the Bale fire, drinking May wine punch made with sweet woodruff and strawberries, dancing, games, making flower wreaths, and face painting.

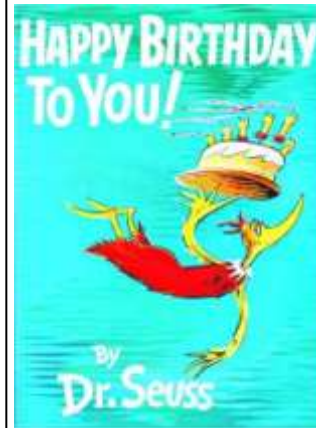

Beltane or **Bealtaine** (pronounced [/bɛlˈtɑːn/](#), origin [Old Irish](#)) is the anglicized spelling of **Bealtaine** (Irish pronunciation: [\[bʲalʲˠtʲɑːnʲə\]](#)) or **Bealltainn** ([\[bʲalʲˠtʲɑːnʲ\]](#)), the [Gaelic](#) names for either the month of May or the festival that takes place on the first day of May. In [Irish Gaelic](#), the month of May is known as *Mí Bhealtaine* or *Bealtaine*, and the festival as *Lá Bealtaine* ('day of Bealtaine' or, '[May Day](#)'). In [Scottish Gaelic](#), the month is known as either (*An Cèitean* or *a' Mhàigh*, and the festival is known as *Latha Bealltainn* or simply *Bealltainn*. The feast was also known as *Céad Shamhain* or *Cétshamhainin* from which the word *Cèitean* derives. As an ancient [Gaelic](#) festival, Bealtaine was celebrated in [Ireland](#), [Scotland](#) and the [Isle of Man](#), though there were similar festivals held at the same time in the other [Celtic](#) countries of [Wales](#), [Brittany](#) and [Cornwall](#). Bealtaine and [Samhain](#) were the leading terminal dates of the civil year in Ireland though the latter festival was the more important. The festival survives in folkloric practices in the [Celtic Nations](#) and the [Irish diaspora](#), and has experienced a degree of revival in recent decades.

THE UU SPIRIT

We have been looking at some important aspects of the UU Spirit as set down in the Covenant we have adopted and pledged to abide by, both in our Congregational life and in our responsibilities to the wider community.

The elements of this Covenant are given in the Chalice Lighting, the Affirmation, and the Chalice Extinguishing.

Our Chalice Lighting ends:

"to serve you, Spirit of Freedom"

Many other UU Congregations use these words from the Passover Haggadah as their Chalice Lighting, with various verbs in this last line: to protect, to preserve, to nourish, to honor, and to respect the Spirit of Freedom.

The Living Tradition we share draws from many sources; number four refers to Jewish and Christian teachings.

The Passover Haggadah, an "instructional manual" of the Passover Seder (Seder meaning order), is a "narration, telling or recital" of events and rituals to be followed, or how to conduct the Passover Seder. The words we use are spoken at the lighting of ceremonial candles. (Google Passover Haggadah for more information)

To review the precepts: the key to Healing yourself and others is Kindness; the key to Helping yourself and others is Compassion; the key to Blessing yourself and others is Gratitude for the blessings bestowed upon you and for those blessings brought into your life by others.

These are profound and potentially life-changing. They deserve some real thought.

If you are trying to incorporate Kindness, Compassion and Gratitude into your personal and Congregational life, you are developing the UU Spirit. When a critical mass is reached, of those individuals with the UU Spirit, then you are on the way to forming a UU Congregation.

The children get this in much simpler terms: Bring your best self along with you on Sunday morning, and you will be amazed at what happens! It's better and funner for you, for your CYRE class, and for working together at community projects. Also, **SURPRISE!** that best self will follow you around more and more during the week!

This is what is meant by the UU SPIRIT.

Palabras del presidente...

Every year the Annunciation House holds its annual Voice of the Voiceless Dinner, and this year was no exception. We began with a traditional, yet simple meal of beans & rice, which was one way of being in solidarity with the poor. The presence of the women's cooperative from Juarez (Las mujeres de esperanza y fe), who sold their hand-made crafts, was one of the highlights of the evening for me. It was obvious these ladies had found hope in situations of despair. And, of course, the prayers and pageantry all set the tone for a blessed yet solemn evening. One topic that received enthusiastic applause from the audience was the mobilization of immigration-rights groups all across the nation (including El Paso) to get Congress to address the urgency of a complete immigration reform. Yet even this *national news headliner* was overshadowed by the *violencia en Mexico*, especially our sister city, Juarez.

According to statistics, since the outbreak of drug-related violence in 2006, close to 23,000 Mexicans have been killed. Juarez alone has suffered more than 5,000 of which close to 200 were children under the age of eighteen. According to Greg Allen, (El Paso chief of police) during the past two years, an estimated 30,000 Mexican nationals fleeing the violence in Juarez have settled into El Paso alone. The Executive Office for Immigration Review reports that it has received 12,110 applications from Mexican nationals seeking political asylum in the United States yet has granted asylum to only 232 individuals-less than 2% of all Mexican applicants. By comparison, the U.S. received 5,879 asylum claims from Colombian nationals during the same time period and granted asylum to 2,351 individuals – nearly 40% of all Colombian applicants. The disparity of these figures raises grave concerns that the asylum process is once again being politicized so as to deny credible asylum consideration to Mexican nationals fleeing the violence in Mexico. Given the above figures, the vast majority of Mexican refugees are electing to forego the asylum process for fear of being detained, denied, and sent back to Mexico. Without any other means of legal relief presently being utilized to protect those fleeing Mexico, these refugees are instead forced to live in hiding and continued fear. Without employment authorization, contemporary Mexican refugees possess little to no financial resources and take the risk of being discovered and deported back into the very nightmare they originally fled.

In light of this reality, the Petition for Protection is being issued and demands made that the Obama Administration, Department of Homeland Security and the Department of Justice restore integrity and credibility to the political asylum application process to ensure that applicants fleeing the violence in Mexico receive an unbiased and credible review of their claims.

If you wish to be a *voice for the voiceless*, send your Petition for Protection to President Barack Obama, Secretary Janet Napolitano DHS, or Attorney General Erick Holder USDOJ. As Ruben Garcia concluded, “Hopefully the actions and steps, be they great or small, of many people together, will be heard in ways that can be stronger than the violence.”
